The Bishops of the United States are calling for a threeyear grassroots revival of devotion and belief in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. They believe that God wants to see a movement of Catholics across the United States — healed, converted, formed, and unified by an encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist - and sent out in mission "for the life of the world." These three years will culminate in the first National Eucharistic Congress in the United States in almost fifty years. Almost a hundred thousand Catholics will join together in Indianapolis for a once-in-a-lifetime pilgrimage toward the "source and summit" of our Catholic faith. For more

# FROM THE PASTOR



I hope that you are all having a spiritually fruitful Lent so far and that you are taking advantage of the opportunities to pray more, to help the poor and to do small acts of penance so that you can make a good spiritual preparation to celebrate Easter.

Please take note of the things that are on offer here at the parish to give you a "little something extra" to do for Lent. There are notations about them elsewhere in this bulletin.

In particular I wanted to note that the Bishop has kindly extended a dispensation to everyone in the Diocese regarding St. Patrick's Day. This is one of those years when St. Patrick's Day falls on a Friday. Of course, on all the Fridays of Lent we are required to abstain from eating meat.

However, on St. Patrick's Day, a holiday that has become very widely celebrated in this country, lots of people really like to eat what has become an Irish-American tradition: corned beef. Now, the eating of corned beef isn't really an "Irish" thing. Over there people tend to have ham and cabbage. I knew one man from Ireland who said they used to have salmon on St. Patrick's Day in his family. That was a real treat for them. Corned beef became a thing here in the US after many Irish immigrants arrived in America and started settling mostly in the East. Corned beef (a beef brisket that has been salt-cured with large grains, or "corns" of salt) was far more readily available and became a substitute for ham.

Of course, in Ireland St. Patrick's Day is a solemnity—the most important kind of Church feast day—and it is a national holiday. Here in the US it is celebrated in most places as a mere commemoration—the lowest kind of Church feast day—because it is subordinate to Lent which is considered far more important. There are some exceptions to be sure. In New York, for example, where St. Patrick is the patron saint of the cathedral and the Archdiocese it is also a solemnity. But, for much of our country it isn't and on the liturgical calendar it is a relatively minor day. Culturally, however, it has become widely celebrated.

Mindful of this and of the custom of eating corned beef on that day the Bishop has commuted the obligation to abstain from Friday to another day that week. What that means is that it's <u>not</u> OK just to skip it that week. Instead, <u>you must abstain from eating meat on some other day</u> in order to make up for <u>Friday</u>, <u>March 17</u>. This is binding on everyone, regardless of your age, and failure to observe it is considered a serious sin (not because meat is bad, but because you would be blatantly disobedient).

So, I hope everyone understands and does the right thing. Have a blessed week ahead and remember above all to Keep The Faith!
