FROM THE PASTOR



Happy New Year to all of you!

This year, like Christmas, New Year's Day falls on a Sunday so the fact that it's a holy day of obligation means that you are able to "kill two birds with one

stone" again. But, at other times <u>January 1</u> is a holy day of obligation (except if it falls on a Saturday or a Monday in which case the obligation is dispensed).

People often ask me why the first day of the year is deemed by the Church to be a holy day of obligation? The simple answer is: *it isn't*.

There are a number of things being commemorated on <u>January 1</u>. For example, it is the *World Day of Peace* and special prayers are offered for peace throughout the world that day.

It is also the **Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God**. This commemorates Mary under the title given to her at the Council of Nicaea in 325AD. Namely, the title *Theotokos* or Mother of God. It is a title that recognizes that even though God is eternal and is the creator of all things—including Mary herself—she was not merely the Mother of Jesus but in fact, the Mother of the Word made flesh; therefore the Mother (in the flesh) of the eternal God who became incarnate in Christ Jesus.

Each year I get a kick out of how many people refer to the feast incorrectly. It is the highest rank of feast which is called a solemnity. But, we tend to refer to all liturgical days as "the feast of...' which leads some people to call <u>January 1</u> not the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God but instead to mistakenly call it "The Feast of the Solemnity of Mary" as though we have a celebration of the fact that Mary was solemn!

The other thing that is happening on January 1 is the Octave Day of Christmas. In the liturgical calendar the most important days are celebrated as an octave for 8 days. There used to be many of them but now there are only two: Christmas and Easter. The latter is always on a Sunday and so is its octave day. But, Christmas can fall on any day of the week and so does its octave day. So, both Christmas and its octave are holy days of obligation. The obligation for the octave, as I already mentioned, is dispensed if it is on a Saturday or a Monday (unlike Christmas which is always a day of obligation) but the real reason we are expected to go to Mass on January 1 is that it is Christmas' Octave. Incidentally, that's why in the older calendar it was seen as the Feast of the Circumcision because boy children were circumcised on the eighth day after birth according to Jewish practice.

I hope the week and the year ahead are filled with blessings, good health and peace & joy in your lives. **Happy New Year!**
