

Generally, what I do for the Thanksgiving holiday, is bring my father to the rectory which makes it much easier on me to prepare a Thanksgiving dinner. After the 9:00am Mass on Thanksgiving morning, I'm in no big hurry to prepare the dinner since, it being just me and my dad, it doesn't really take that long. What I'll do this year is go out the morning before Thanksgiving to a local butcher shop and purchase a whole chicken. The chicken is usually somewhere between 3 ½ and 4 lbs. It's locally raised and easy to work with.

Back when she was still living, my mother had given me her rotisserie oven which still works just fine. I simply wash the chicken, pull off a little excess fat, tie up the legs and wings so they don't flop around in the oven, skewer the chicken before placing it into the oven and setting the timer for 15 minutes per pound. I usually add about two or three minutes to the timer, but no more.

Notice that there is no need to season the chicken. It selfbastes and comes out very flavorful. At most, I take some fresh herbs from the pots that I have out on the patio and stuff them into the chicken. Usually I choose from rosemary, thyme, sage and oregano; perhaps a combination of some of these. The size of the chickens that I use never requires more than an hour in the oven. Usually it's right around 57 minutes. It's like you hear on one of those info commercials: *Just set it and forget it*!

This year I'm planning on trying a recipe for the gravy that is new to me. I recently saw it on a cooking show and took note of the steps to follow. It involves using parts of the chicken such as the neck and gizzard together with some chicken broth, white wine, flour, olive oil and butter, celery and carrots, rosemary and thyme sprigs (which I have on my patio) as well as the drippings from the chicken. I'm looking forward to trying this new recipe and will make some mashed potatoes to go along with it.

Cranberry sauce is always a must! This year, I can't wait to try some homemade cranberry sauce given to me by one of you, our very thoughtful parishioners here at Saint Joseph's.

Finally, just a vegetable. My dad's favorite is asparagus so I'll probably go with that. I might also add something like broccoli or carrots. Usually I cut up the carrots julienne style and steam them in a small steaming pot that I have. I never use the pre-cut, pre-peeled carrots since I find

them so dried out. To me, it's like eating cardboard. Well now, you know a little bit about the fussy side of me.

As I write this column, it is the Friday before Thanksgiving since around holidays, the bulletin companies always

require that the bulletin get turned in early for publication. I do realize though, that by the time you pick up this bulletin at church, it will be the weekend after Thanksgiving.

It's my prayer that God bless all of you and your families with a very joyful Thanksgiving Day and into the weekend following!

OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE

First Reading: Ezekiel 34:11-12, 15-17

This passage beautifully describes how the Lord God, as shepherd, will tend his flock. He will rescue those who are lost, bring back those who stray, heal the sick, and "pasture" all.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:20-26, 28
